

Venerable Tzu Chuang Biography

Venerable Tzu Chuang, born in 1931 in Yilan, Taiwan, came from a well-off family and excelled both academically and personally from a young age. She pursued her education at Kyoto Buddhist University in Japan after becoming a disciple of Venerable Master Hsing Yun in 1965.

Throughout her life, Venerable Tzu Chuang held numerous significant roles within Fo Guang Shan Buddhist community. She served as the Director of Academic Affairs at Shou Shan Buddhist College, President of the Oriental Buddhist College, and Abbess of Pu Men Vihara, Fo Guang Shan Taipei Branch Temple, and Hsi Lai Temple in the United States. She also played key roles as a member of the Fo Guang Shan Executive Council, Director of the Overseas Supervisory Office, and Executive Director of the Fo Guang Pure Land Cultural and Educational Foundation.

Venerable Tzu Chuang was a pioneer in establishing Buddhist cultural centres throughout Taiwan, laying the groundwork for their widespread influence. She was entrusted with founding the Buddhist Cultural Service Centre in Sanchong, Taipei, which initiated a new era of Buddhist scripture printing. Her work later expanded to Kaohsiung, where she continued to broaden the reach of Buddhist teachings. As the Director of the Overseas Supervisory Office, she was instrumental in the global expansion of Fo Guang Shan, representing the community in signing agreements with the Australian government, paving the way for the spread of Buddhism in the Southern Hemisphere.

Despite advancing age, Venerable Tzu Chuang remained deeply committed to her mission, driven by a profound sense of duty and responsibility to the Buddhist community. Her life is a testament to her tireless efforts to elevate the status and respect of Buddhist nuns. Her legacy is evident in the many temples she helped establish and the enduring impact of her work in spreading the Dharma worldwide.
