Venerable Tzu Hui Biography

Born in 1934 in Taipei, Taiwan, Venerable Tzu Hui moved to Yilan during her childhood due to her father's work. Raised in a devout Buddhist family, her parents emphasised the importance of education, which laid the foundation for her lifelong dedication to the propagation of Buddhism. Venerable Tzu Hui has made profound contributions to Buddhist education and translation throughout her life.

A trailblazer in many respects, Venerable Tzu Hui is the first Taiwanese Buddhist nun to pursue higher education abroad, earning a Master of Arts in Literature from Japan's Otani University. She is also the first to obtain a teaching qualification from Taiwan's Ministry of Education, allowing her to teach at the university level. Her linguistic proficiency in Mandarin, Taiwanese, and Japanese has enabled her to serve as a translator for Venerable Master Hsing Yun in Dharma propagation for over seven decades, with her translations renowned for their elegance and accuracy.

Throughout her monastic life, Venerable Tzu Hui has held numerous influential positions within Fo Guang Shan, including serving as the Director of Education and the Head of multiple Buddhist institutions. She has been instrumental in assisting Venerable Master Hsing Yun in founding Buddhist colleges both in Taiwan and overseas and served as the Chairperson of the Nan Tien Institute from 2011 to 2022. Venerable Tzu Hui also held leadership roles in international Buddhist organisations, including the World Fellowship of Buddhists.

Venerable Tzu Hui's dedication to education extends beyond monastic settings. She has served as a principal and founder of various educational institutions, from kindergartens to universities, making her one of the most experienced and accomplished Buddhist nuns in the field of education. Her work has left a lasting impact on countless individuals worldwide.
